

Headquarters had changed up the order of ceremonies, in that they started distributed Hallmark Awards directly after the opening of the first general session. At the 93rd Annual Convention held in Seattle, WA all Hallmark Awards were distributed during the third general session on Saturday night.

The first award that Headquarters distributed was the Distinguished Regional Officer Hallmark Award. They stated that there would be ten recipients. They began calling names from throughout the conference center. I did not know if I had been nominated for the hallmark. However, just like every other regional officer, I waited for my name to be called. They called five names and had a long pause...I began inquiring of those sitting around me, "Is that all?" I received my answer as they resumed calling names. I thought I was counting properly, and I reached ten and thought "I guess I didn't get the award." Then all of the sudden on the jumbotron sized screen in front of us had my name on it. The entire Region erupted with cheers. Hope Buell, the Michigan Regional PR/Historian, grabbed my chair and pushed me up the ramp to receive my award. I had a smile that no one could take off my face. Hope pushed me down the ramp and to our assigned place.

The next announced award was the distinguished regional officer teams and unfortunately they announced all three regional teams without saying our name. The very next award was the Distinguished Region award. There were only two awarded this honor. I began praying we would receive this award because my fellow regional officers had worked just as hard as I had, and they deserved to be honored as well. Thankfully, my prayers were answered almost immediately. The Michigan Region was one of two regions selected. The entire region erupted in cheers, and if possible, they seemed louder than before. This time Kari Kahler, Michigan Regional Coordinator, grabbed my wheelchair and pushed me to the stage to receive this award. I received the award and returned to our assigned area and passed the award to the Regional Board.

I no sooner left the convention hall when strangers would approach me and shake my hand, or give me a hug and tell me congratulations. My immediate instinct was to say that I was at the front of the line with a wonderful Regional Board and Region behind me. This happened no fewer than one hundred times throughout the weekend. A friend of mine from New York quipped "you were on stage more frequently than Dr. Rod Risley".

One of the most notable times was when myself and chapter officers went to the outlet mall for lunch during the down time on Saturday afternoon. We 'walked' through the parking lot to get to the mall, but decided to take the shuttle bus back to the hotel. We were waiting in line as the bus arrived, I began moving to the front to access the handicapped spot and someone yelled from the crowd "Get out of Mike's way". That was truly when I realized that I had achieved "Rock Star" status.

As with all good things, this too had to come to an end.

The Junior Journalism Program





I believe that if you tell a child that they are at risk and under privileged, they will be. I believe even more that if you tell a child they can be anything they want to be and that they can reach for the stars, they will.

As Editor-in-Chief of my college newspaper, "*Erie Square Gazette*," our community service project collected coats for needy children in Port Huron Michigan. I received a phone call from teacher, Hannah Palmer, thanking me. Her students at Woodrow Wilson Elementary School had received some of our donated coats. Palmer shared that



her kids didn't get the breaks some kids did and they had been labeled as "at risk." What I saw was a group of bright kids who had great potential as writers, thus the "*Erie Square Gazette"* Junior Journalism Program was born.

Journalism students from our college visited the local school, teaching the children the basics of sentence structure, the inverted pyramid and "what makes a good news story." The children published their school's first ever student newspaper.

We have just completed our second year of the junior journalism program, and it has expanded. We are in our second year at Woodrow Wilson Elementary School and are now working with students at Cleveland Elementary School here in Port Huron. A total of three classrooms of children participate, and both schools' student newspapers are linked to our online newspaper at the college.

Each school publishes two hard copy issues of their own papers; "Palmer Town News" and "News from the Hive, the voice of Cleveland Elementary School. In addition the students are now using their new-found journalism skills to write records and produce their own "Junior Radio Program"- the "Palmer Rock Radio Show."

The program is making a difference in the lives of these children. As Phi Theta Kappans we can use this program to reach hundreds of children all across our state. It is a great way to give back to those less fortunate than us.

A little boy named Ethan was on staff for the inaugural issue of his school's paper. When the papers were delivered, Ethan saw that his photograph had been used. The child approached me and said "That says Ethan that's Me!" To see the pride and self-worth on this young boy's face is something I will never forget.

I am asking each Kappan that reads this to please take the "Junior Journalism" suggestion to their college's newspapers. It is my hope fellow Kappans across the state can help start similar programs in their communities that will make a difference in these children's lives.

Alpha Omicron Gamma Officer Wins Coca-Cola Leaders of Promise Scholarship

The scholarship revolved around a student's activity and leadership roles both on and off campus. Kevin is the student representative on the Curriculum and Instruction Committee, VP of the student senate, and a chapter officer. He has been awarded departmental scholarships by Kirtland Community College and is very active both on and off campus.

In 2011 Phi Theta Kappa, benefactors Lou and Rosemary Oberndorf, and the 2011-2012 International Officers Team announce the creation of the scholarship and set out with a goal to make it last. Since its unveiling, a challenge to raise funds to be matched by the Oberndorfs one-to-one has been set forth.

In Nashville, Tennessee during the Phi Theta Kappa 2012 Annual Convention, a challenge was presented to all present chapters: to make it the last little way to meet the original challenge of \$125,000 set before members when the scholarship was initially announced. As a region, we rose to meet this challenge, in less than three hours we raised a total of \$2,500! The challenge was meet in Nashville and it now continues. A second challenge of \$125,000 has been now set before the members to continue to raise the funds that will be there for years to come to act as that needed lifeline.

There are multiple avenues that one can take in order to give to this endeavor. Individuals can look to the Phi Theta Kappa website to give electronically or start their own chapter fundraisers to contribute donations. By contributing to scholarships that as members we reach out to when we go to take our next step we are helping each other. We are contributing to the rope that helps hoist members out of the current and back onto their path towards success.

Communication Across the Divide By Clara Cherry, 2011/2012 President-Elect, MRAA



Even a communication pro can take a few pointers from history. Through colorful tales of the wizard Merlin, Knight Lancelot, powerful Excalibur and the vision and dream of Camelot, we find that King Arthur is the epitome of effective communication and management of multiple and regionally distributed teams. The tale of King Arthur and the Knights of the Round Table can teach us how to transform a geographically challenged group of individuals whose actions fall short of goals into a virtual team that gets results. And it all comes down to communication techniques!

A true team is built on communication, trust, and a shared vision as well as a variety of skills and strengths of the team as a whole. Just as King Arthur found ways to bond the knights across England, successful chapters bond their knights (officers) in three ways.

First, recognize the emotional bond. Your "Camelot" (vision for the chapter) has to be a concept embraced by each of your members; bonding them through discussing and shaping the vision. Involvement starts when you ensure your members are heard no matter their position or campus location. Champion your members by hearing their ideas, listen to what they have to offers, but do not push to provide an answer. Instead share additional information to empower the members.

Second, find the intellectual link. Every member needs to have the same, clear description of the goals and vision of the chapter. Having a clearly written agreement that each member had a voice in defining reinforces and enhances the members commitment to such a level that he will strive to meet the overarching goals even when a leader is not present.

Third, identify an alignment tool - one question or statement that links people across distances throughout the project. The Knights of the Round Table qualified their actions by determining if it met the criteria "Might for Right". If not, the knight knew to change his actions or requested help from another.

King Arthur's success in building Camelot shows us the benefits of moving away from the idea that a team consists of a one leader, in one location, with a group of followers; towards a shared vision, shared values, and open and frequent communications all aid in taking the chapter to new heights no matter the distance.
